BISHOP'S PASTORAL LETTER

We all know that things have become progressively more serious in Cumbria concerning the Foot and Mouth disaster. It is having a very serious effect on the whole of the county, both in the farming communities and way beyond. In the light of this I am writing this letter to be read in our Anglican churches and to offer support to the members of our congregations and to the many people beyond our congregations to whom this letter may be delivered.

The cull of sheep and pigs in a two mile radius around infected farms brings the tragedy into a great many more farms, along with the anguish of seeing thousands of apparently healthy animals destroyed. Many here have worked day and night to disinfect and protect their flocks and herds only to see their work apparently wasted. We understand that the spread of the disease must be stopped. Whether it is right or wrong, the cull is designed to put a clear break between infected and non-infected farms, seeing that the disease is so difficult to detect quickly in sheep.

The disaster is now affecting thousands of people beyond the farming industry. Tourism has been badly hit, and that is a major contributor to the economy of the county. The loss of business to hotels, guesthouses, shops and suppliers is very serious, as it is also to the haulage industry which has a strong base in Cumbria.

I speak for many when I say that I have utter sympathy with the pain, the despair and the anger that people feel at this time. We know that many have been in tears. Words are inadequate to express our support. In due course there will be important questions to ask about how our national food production works in order that such a disaster may never happen again.

Times of great adversity are also times of great caring. In our churches both clergy and members of the congregations have been keeping in frequent touch with those who are isolated by the disease. To offer such a network of support helps those who are suffering stress to feel there is someone there for them. Acts of kindness such as fetching shopping, newspapers and prescriptions will be appreciated. Funds are available to help in the cases of hardship.

The Bible reminds us to call out to God when we are suffering. In church and in our own homes let us do that. We need God's mercy. We need his help. He will hear us. He does not protect us from all disaster, but he always seeks our well being. He wants to bring good out of evil.

The cross of Christ tells us that God shares our human pain. The Easter Day resurrection tells us that there is always hope, even where it is least expected. It is because Jesus is alive that he is there to be with us and help us in these dreadful times for Cumbria.

So we pray:

God of hope and love, visit this land with your healing power. In your goodness, restore our communities so affected by disease, ruin and the loss of hope. Have mercy on the people of Cumbria. Bring comfort to all those who are deeply affected by the tragedy. Have mercy on your whole creation which is groaning in pain. Guide us to wise stewardship of your beautiful world, that all your creatures may live in peace and health. We ask this in the name of him through whom all things are made new, even Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen

Lent Project

Please continue to pray for our Lent projects and all those caught up in the conflict in the troubled land of Israel. The following requests have just reached us from the House of Victory and Musalaha.

House of Victory. There has been a sharp increase in requests to enter the drug rehabilitation programme. Seven want to start, among whom are a Jew in prison, a Bedouin and a Druze man, but there are places for only four. We are asked to pray that the places will go to the right four and that with the beautiful time of Spring approaching there will be new life in the House of Victory too.

Musalaha. Over the Easter/Passover break Musalaha is hosting two Desert Encounters. One is for 25-30 university students who will go into the beautiful desert of Wadi Rum, Jordan; the other is for teenagers who will explore the Negev desert. Please pray for the leaders and guides as they plan the trips and for each participant, Jew and Arab, that they will experience forgiveness, reconciliation and spiritual growth.

Ellel Ministries

Jim and Pat Radcliffe, Sylvia Read and Edward Thomas attended Ellel's International Conference entitled "Let the Oppressed Go Free" in February.

This title reflects the need in lives the world over to be released from the devastation and suffering caused by oppression. People everywhere carry the scars of man's inhumanity witnessed in war and ethnic cleansing down to the individual locked into domestic abuse, the child victim, the lonely and the despairing. The only hope for all victims anywhere is the saving Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Speakers included Dr. Derek Prince - who spoke of God's heart for the widow and the orphan; Johannes Facius - healed from the curse of deep depression, who brought understanding of God's heart for the oppressed; and Kimberley Daniels - a dynamic black pastor from America, shared her testimony of being set free from drugs, violence and rebellion. Peter Walker, an Aboriginal, spoke without condemnation of the pain of his people in Australia at the hands of the British settlers, while Eliyahu Ben Haim came from Jerusalem to bring insights into the oppression of God's people, the Jews, and the dangers of humanism. Peter Horrobin, Director of Ellel Ministries, focused attention on the keys to healing and the message of hope found in the Gospel. Other teachers from Ellel's centres in Canada, Hungary and England also spoke at teaching seminars. News was shared of centres for healing and deliverance opening in Scotland and Australia, and opportunities for outreach into Ghana, Taiwan and Malaysia.

SAMS TRAINING DAY

On Saturday 17th February a group of us attended the SAMS (South American Mission Society) Training Day in Bolton. It is an annual event and please don't be put off by the Training Day title! In fact it is always a very varied and interesting day where we learn a lot more about the work going on in South America from people who really are on the front line of an organisation we have supported for many years.

This year we heard from Bishop Colin Baxley and his wife Barbara, just retired after 37 years in Chile, Bob Lunt, translating the Bible into the Wichi language in N. Argentina, Miriam Peat on home leave from a very practical work in Brazil setting up agricultural projects to help the local people, and Simeon and Catherine Mitton working on an Orphoids project on an entirely new venture into Ecuador looking after families struck down by Aids, caring for parents who are dying and then taking in the surviving children into their own extended family in a "cottage home" situation.
