My Dear Friends

We are in one of those in-between seasons. We have celebrated Easter and we look forward to Ascension and Pentecost. Nothing much seems to happen unlike the disciple's experience after Jesus resurrection. Yet when we look at the Gospel narratives not a lot seems to be happening - a bit of fishing, hanging around as a group and having contact with Jesus at totally unpredictable times. However much, I believe, was happening of which we have no record. The disciples were being prepared for the Ascension and Pentecost. Because of that preparation they were filled with joy when Jesus ascended (humanly speaking one would have thought they would have been sad) and there was expectation in the air as they awaited the promised gift of the Holy Spirit.

What was so significant that they could have this attitude? Let us look at the record. Each time Jesus spent with his disciples he was teaching them and explaining the Scriptures - even better than an author taking you through his autobiography page by page! Jesus gave his followers Bible studies - the Word revealing the Word! How exciting it must have been. If Jesus thought it so important that he spent time 'opening their minds to understand the Scriptures' then it gives us our priority. When we imagine nothing much was happening for the disciples the most important thing was going on and it was the vital basis from which they could set out and teach. Peter in the first Christian sermon quoted the prophet Joel at length, and I would not be surprised if it had been one of the passages Jesus explained to help them when the Spirit came.

Bible study, Bible reading and Bible exposition are vital for the individual and the church. We have Jesus' attitude clearly revealed. When there was so much to do he explained the Scriptures because nothing else was as important. What place does the Bible have in our lives and in that of the Church? Does it come first or only when it can be fitted in. If we want to hear God speak today we must first immerse ourselves in the written Word so that the Living Word can start to speak to us and then through us.

Also present was Linda Kirkup, W.R.V.S Food Services Manager Cumbria, who introduced Sadie Baker, V.C.C. (Clitheroe), Allison Jackson - Cumbria Contract Services M-on-W manager, Lynne Sneap, Voluntary Manager, Denice Wilson (Barrow) who all praised the success of the work. Mary Davidson, local organiser detailed how the service began, has flourished over the years and now has 50 drivers and helpers who deliver meals cooked at Croftside. Miss Holme married Mr. Punchard at age 36: later moving to Arnside, where she died. Mrs. Bates read passages from various novels, bringing them to life.

“Where on earth is that?! you may be wondering. Well... it's a very small country in **West Africa** next to **Benin**, both of which are sandwiched between **Ghana** to the west and **Nigeria** to the east, and just north of the Equator.

“Why on earth are you going there?” might be your next question. We are going for 3 weeks as volunteers with Wycliffe Associates, a support group for Wycliffe Bible Translators (WBT), to look after the children of WBT personnel based in Togo and Benin while they attend their bi-annual Conference in Kara in the north of the country. We will travel to Kara from Lome, the capital of Togo on the Atlantic coast, by bush taxi, a journey of 250 miles over largely unmade roads that will take 7 hours! We will spend 2½ weeks at the centre in Kara working very hard in hot dry conditions with temperatures of around 35+ degrees max and 22 min, doing our best to avoid getting bitten by mosquitoes and innumerable other beasties. Then we return by bush taxi to Lome, where it will be slightly less hot but very humid, for a few days as tourists while we wait for our return flight!

One of the main reasons for going is to meet up with Bibi Nedellec, whom we support in prayer and financially in our churches (do you remember the Lent Project - Bibi's Bandages - a few years ago?). Bibi has been working in Benin for WBT for 10 years with another 5 years to complete the project, and she has come to tell us about her work on several visits to Heversham during those 10 years. She will be attending the Conference and it will be wonderful to see her (almost!) in her place of work. (In fact her journey to Kara from her village in Benin is about a third of the distance we will cover travelling up from Lome!)

We would value your prayers as we prepare for the trip - especially as we are in the middle of having all the necessary vaccinations and taking malaria protection tablets. We are very excited about it all, but there is a good degree of trepidation too!

It is also our intention to take out with us a gift of money for Bibi to use as is most appropriate, so watch this space for some fundraising events in very near future which you may like to attend, or perhaps make a donation if you can't.

The fees for the morning classes are £125. The Solo Performers Classes are an extra £65.
