My Dear Friends

Tuesday, 11th September will be one of those dates permanently engraved on people's memories throughout the world. The sheer scale of the disaster which struck New York and Washington exceeded even the blockbuster disaster movies. One couldn't believe the events unfolding live on TV were real.

We can only imagine the range of emotions which people experienced - disbelief, fear, numbness, panic and grief, the latter giving way to anger as the reality sunk in. Even at this distance, with the Atlantic in between, it is very easy to share those same emotions which are perfectly natural in the circumstances.

While they are natural in the circumstances, and they help people to cope with the disaster, it is important that they do not provoke a knee-jerk reaction. Decisions taken in anger rarely deal with the real situation. St. James in his letter (1:20) put it very clearly - 'Men's anger does not bring about the righteous life that God desires'. So our prayer in this situation must be that the international coalition acts on facts not suppositions, misinformation, hunches or prejudices and that any actions are finely focused and within what international law regards as acceptable otherwise the coalition is no better than the terrorists they condemn and seek to isolate and eradicate.

Leadership in this situation must be truly difficult. Leaders always need our prayers but particularly at this time. They have to respond to the hurt and anger people feel. They cannot do nothing because that looks like weakness and can give terrorism the wrong message. They are, as the phrase puts it, between a rock and a hard place. However another question about anger arises. Are we primarily angry because of what has happened to us or because God's desires have been thwarted? Jesus was angry on many occasions but never because of what happened to him. It was always because of mankind's disregard of God's desires. When people were opposed to him he still loved them and sought to change their attitudes - he never resorted to violence. St. Paul who encountered much physical as well as verbal opposition and violence wrote to the Christians in Rome, upon whom dreadful persecution was about to fall, 'do not be overcome by evil but overcome evil with good' (Romans 12²¹). Paul was often between the rock and the hard place but his rock was Jesus Christ and his work was to bring the hard place to Jesus.

My prayer is that the western leaders will seek out the reasons why the terrorists acted as they did just as enthusiastically as they seek the terrorists themselves. Jesus heals by dealing with the cause not just the symptoms. By all means deal with the terrorists but we must make sure we address the cause which gives terrorism its fuel.

May all who are suffering in any way from these tragedies know of all the prayer for them, but may they also know the Rock on whom our western civilization is based and seek to apply the Jesus solution to the hard place in which they find themselves. May God bless America as that nation stands on The Rock and seeks to bring Jesus' love to the hard place.

Milnthorpe Family Centre - New Premises

Milnthorpe Community Playgroup (Parent & Toddler Group and Pre-school) now operate from purpose designed portakabins within the grounds of Milnthorpe Primary School. We are still running two Toddler Group sessions weekly and six pre-school sessions weekly. In addition we will be taking children on Wraparound care, in the short term, from 8.30 a.m. until 3.30 p.m. daily. We are intending this care to increase until we are offering care from 8.00 a.m. until 6.00 p.m. daily (term-time and non-term time) for children aged 2 up to statutory school age. For a timetable and costs of our current provision please contact our **Playgroup Leader, Rae Martin on 105395 64289.**

We are also running Out of School Clubs for children age 5-11 years each morning and evening and during the school holiday. For costs and further information please contact the **Club Leader, Nicky Moore on 015395 62127.**

In the long term we hope to have our own purpose designed building which will then mean we can offer care for children age 0 - 11 on one site. We are currently applying for grants for this purpose and hope to achieve our aim within the next couple of years. so watch this space.....

To Ukraine with Hope Now

Anyone who goes abroad on active service with HOPE NOW soon learns that they have to be prepared for absolutely anything (Vic Jackopson is fond of saying, "Be prepared to preach or die at the drop of a hat, and not necessarily in that order!") so I shouldn't really have been surprised to find that, having gone out expecting to help in the running of a Christian Holiday Camp at Mihailovka Orphanage, I found myself being part of a Prison-outreach team. Vic and I went to the Camp most mornings but the bulk of our time was given to prisons; we travelled about 700 miles and met and spoke to about 1,000 prisoners. Visiting prisons is not a new experience for me but I have to say that this concentrated bout of prison visiting opened my eyes in a significant way: meeting the boys in the Young Offenders prison at Preluki and the women in the prison at Uman and the men in Stari Babani and Prison 62, it struck me very forcibly that they were imprisoned for a huge variety of reasons but each one had, in some way, broken the laws of the land; each one had, in some way, "fallen short". Then it struck me: have not we, every one of us, compared with the incomparable goodness and holiness of God, "fallen short"? The words of St. Paul (Romans 3, 23) became significantly real to me: "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God." Deeply aware of that, one is far more deeply grateful for the means of Redemption offered through the self-sacrificial love of our Lord Jesus Christ.

While there, it was also very good to see a number of old friends again, several of whom are known to some readers of this piece as, at some time in the past 5 years, they have spoken, read, sung or played in St. Peter's: Olga Osipova, now married and expecting her first baby; her brother Andrey, now 20 and a most impressive young man (brilliant organising the Games at Camp), Sergei Kusyumov, as nice as ever and now studying

Law; Danik (unforgettable quintessence of mischief!) Vishemeersky, now 13; the Tarasenko family, all in fine form in spite of Sasha losing his job as Prison Governor after becoming a Christian last year..... to name just a few. Lastly I returned feeling that I had been away for several weeks and not just 11 days.

Saint Peter's Parish Church Sunday School

The Sunday School meets at 9.30 a.m. in the Old School on most Sundays during term time. (See dates below) On a first Sunday of the month we usually hold a Family Service at 9.30 a.m. and the Sunday School joins in from the start.

We give the children, who should be of Primary school age, appropriate Christian teaching. After the teaching the children leave the Old School and join the congregation in Church where they join the adults and receive a blessing during the Communion.
