My Dear Friends

'What the women said was nonsense!' How often do we males utter such comments? And why? Usually because we think we have everything worked out logically and rationally and do not think that emotional outbursts are at all appropriate. Beside that women do not appreciate the real world! But how often the women have been proved right - perhaps far more than we males are inclined to admit.

This attitude is not a 21<sup>st</sup> century phenomenon - the words quoted at the start are from the 1<sup>st</sup> century. The real men thought the women were talking a lot of nonsense although the women had gone out while the men were too scared to venture outside the barred doors! Logic told them that the dead don't get up out of tombs, so Jesus could not have done so. Jesus was dead and buried. Grief must have distorted the women's reason. They were therefore not to be believed. Yet it was an intriguing enough story for Peter and John to go and have a look. They went and came back amazed. (St. Luke 24 vv 1-12).

This passage tells us that the women remembered and believed what Jesus had said - the men did not take it seriously. Because the women believed Jesus they knew what had happened. This is the pattern throughout history. The women all down the centuries have, in the main, been the believers - faith and belief being, as far as men are concerned, women's business. So the men are afraid to come out from behind closed doors and minds and see Jesus risen and admit that logic and reason are out of their depth.

The real world, today as then, has the risen Jesus at large in it. To deny, dispute or doubt this fact is to live in an unreal world barred and shuttered to keep out reality. We only live in the real world when we accept the risen Lord as alive today and live our lives in his presence.

'They thought that what the women said was nonsense.' That group of men at least had the humility to admit the women were right and to act on that reality. Let us all, men and women alike, move out from behind the closed doors of our minds and accept our Risen Lord.

May the joy of Easter be yours.

### **Heversham Projects**

By the time this is in print the alterations within St. Peter's will have been completed and the whole of the Church will be available for use. The changes have been less than some had feared, the beauty of the Church has been increased more than others had dared hope and the 'openness' has been welcomed by many especially as they enter the Church. The forward Altar Table position enables anyone using a wheelchair to join with the rest of the congregation at the new Communion rail. It is our intention to use every part of the Church regularly. The Chancel, which now has its own sound system and loop, will be used for 8 a.m. Communion Services on Sundays, the 10 a.m. Service on Tuesdays and for Sung Evensong and Praise and Worship at 6.30 p.m. on the first and second Sundays respectively. It will also be used for the smaller occasional services and also by the Orchestra at Family Worship.

The ramped access from the South Aisle, near the Font, will make the Dallam Chapel open to every member of the congregation.

All this has been made possible through the great generosity of very many people as has the work on the Old School and path which will start later in April. The PCC is most grateful to all who have helped to make these projects a reality. We feel such developments will be an aid as we seek to proclaim the Good News of Jesus at the beginning of this still new century and beyond.

Thanks are also expressed to all those who over the last two months have kept the dust and dirt at bay so that we could continue to use the Church. Some have spent long hours dusting, washing, vacuuming and tidying the Church, many on a weekly basis. The practical help and understanding shown by all has meant that the congregation is even more together than perhaps it was before.

So, thank you to all, because all have made a contribution to the interior project. We hope to welcome Bishop Graham in late May when we have invited him to come to dedicate the work.
