Doing what I have been doing this past week in Ukraine cannot really be counted as "work": I have been doing the things that I most enjoy —teaching English and Music to pupils who want to learn, with the extra dimension — amazing, this, considering where I was — of being encouraged to share my Christian faith. It has been, if I am honest, a very enjoyable week! And I return with a heart overflowing with thankfulness that I was given this opportunity. I return feeling as though I've enjoyed a fantastic holiday!

Not that it has been a rest-cure, mind you: teaching every lesson in the day, starting at 8.30 am, with teachers always there to talk or ask questions in the breaks. Also, at their request, an extra lesson at the end of one day for a group of English teachers themselves!

My specific brief was to introduce the pupils to English Christmas Carols so I usually started by making the point that, just as, when a volcano erupts, we can glimpse vividly something of the tremendous fire that is always raging in the depths of our planet, so, in the occasional event in history, we can glimpse especially clearly the love of God our heavenly Father. His love for us, each one of us, never wavers for a moment, but we may not always be aware of it; we cannot always see it or feel it. Christmas was just such an event — a "spiritual volcano"! - and the birth of Jesus Christ ("the reason for the season") was so amazing and wonderful that, during the past 2000 years, men have been inspired to paint and carve, to build beautiful buildings and to write poetry and music to honour the event.

Of the many hundreds of Carols that there are it wasn't possible to do more than 3 or 4 with each class but favourites were "Silent Night" (the chance there to explain 'Saviour' and 'Redemption') and the traditional "The Holly and the Ivy" (the chance there to consider Jesus' passion and sufferings). With the older groups we often gave time to Christina Rossetti's beautiful "In the bleak midwinter"; the last line — 'Give my heart' - spurred me to quote Revelation 3, 20 ("I stand at the door and knock ... ") and to tell them of Holman Hunt's famous picture. With all age-groups — 7-17 was the range — we ended with the traditional "We wish you a merry Christmas"; this one invariably got an especially rousing rendering, especially from the Teachers' group!

Good tidings we bring". What are 'tidings'? News. The astonishing, astounding news that "God so loved the world that he gave his Son ... "(John 3, 16). **HALLELUJAH!**"

Christian Solidarity Worldwide

Six of us met in November to write Christmas cards to Christians imprisoned for their faith. We wrote about 120 cards to prisoners in Peru, Egypt, Pakistan, Vietnam, Indonesia and India. As many will have seen on the television news, the Englishman, Ian Stillman, to whom we have sent cards for several years when he was in prison in India, was released in December — that was wonderful news!

A recent visit to Ukraine and Israel

In December 2002 I spent 11 days in Odessa, Ukraine, before taking a sailing from Odessa to Haifa, Israel. The purpose of my visit was to bring support and encouragement to the team members of the Ebenezer Emergency Fund, who work from a base in the city assisting the Jewish people in Ukraine return to their homeland by ship.

The weather was distinctly chilly, reaching — 14 °C. The electricity supply couldn't be totally relied upon and the hot water was available 6 evenings out of 7, from 9.00 — 11.00 pm. Food was adequate and hot soup very welcome — mashed potato and a chicken leg was often a main dish — we wondered what happened to the rest of the chicken!!

One of our volunteers had had a fall the day before I arrived and she spent 3 days in hospital before flying home to England for further surgery on a broken foot. This gave insight into the poor hospital conditions and the desperation of the doctors for equipment and medicines.

It was a huge privilege to participate in the sailing: I observed that amongst the 160 Jewish immigrants there was a blind man, 2 pregnant women, the elderly and infirm, and young parents with their children ... God's word was being fulfilled:

Jeremiah 31: 8-10. 'Behold, I will bring them from the north country, and gather them for the ends of the earth, among them the blind and the lame, the woman with child and the one who labours with child, together; a great throng shall return there ... For He who scattered Israel will gather him, and keep him as a shepherd does his flock.'

Lent Project 2003 — The ILITHA Project

This year's Lent Project is in support of **Hope Africa**, a Christian charity working under the patronage of the **Anglican Diocese of Cape Town**. **ILITHA** —meaning "light" - is a project in one of the township "settlements" in Cape Town where there is great poverty and deprivation, unemployment, crime, disease, hunger and hopelessness.

The project provides a schoolroom/childcare centre in a small, rickety, one-room shack among rows and rows of others in the vast township. Ninety under sixes come in "shifts" every day to sing, play and learn in safety.

However there is a great need for materials such as books, toys, crayons, paints, puzzles, chairs and tables, food, milk, blankets and clothing for the winter. With more financial resources, there is hope that materials could be provided to build a proper building, possibly with a kitchen and toilet facilities which are much needed.

Please look at the **notice boards** in both St Peter and St Thomas' churches for more information and look out for the **envelopes** to collect money in during Lent. The rest of the seamen are untrained, are badly paid and are forced to work much longer hours than their Union allows. The ship owners often cut their food. It is the Mission to Seafarers that tries to help by getting better working conditions for them. Where the ships are impounded in port because of unpaid dues the sailors are left without food, water or heating. The Missions to Seafarers helps and feeds them.
