My Dear Friends

A major season is almost upon us — it starts on 5 March but unlike Christmas it is a commercial non-starter. So don't expect to see posters, adverts or decorations in the shops. Because of the often negative notions about it some shops may not particularly like it! I speak of the season of Lent which can be a most dangerous time of the year. Dangerous on two counts.

The first danger is that we join in some spiritual activity and come face to face with the living God. The result is that our life can never be the same again. This is the hall-mark of a Christian — a changed life — because no one can encounter God and come away unscathed. If anyone joins a home group or attends an act of worship and leaves feeling no different or that they can carry on as before then they have not met the God we see revealed in and by Jesus and who is alive in God's people through the power of the Holy Spirit. No one can meet with God and not be challenged, corrected, instructed and empowered. God is not in the 'there, there it will be all right' business. We have to take up our cross each day to be a disciple of Jesus and that means imitating Jesus and allowing God to do his thing in us, with us and through us. The good a Christian does is therefore not the result of their effort but of the Holy Spirit enabling them to do the Jesus action. That is the first danger — exposure to the living God as shown by and in Jesus.

The second danger is very insidious and one the devil has a hand in. It is that we think we have discharged our duty towards God for the year if we take part in some Lent activity — as though it were an injection which made an annual boost. We must never cease to learn, yet it is alarming that so many have not received any Christian instruction since their mid-teens or even Sunday School. Perhaps we have come to see the weekly sermon as supplying all the teaching we need. The sermon is primarily the proclamation of God's word for us today. It may contain some teaching but that is not its primary purpose. Proclamation speaks of our situation and what God has done about it and what he will do in our lives if we will let him but it needs regular teaching, instruction and learning to back it up and give it foundation. Lent is a good time to start the good habit.

When we look at the two dangers we soon realise that only the second is really a danger. The first is truly a blessing.

Let us this Lent expose ourselves to God's blessings.

### Bible Society — Bibles for asylum seekers

It is encouraging to know that the Bible Society is supplying Bibles to asylum seekers in detention centres around England.

Harmondsworth Detention Centre at Heathrow houses up to 550 men, women and children; recently the Society took in over 200 Bibles in a variety of languages. As the box of Bibles was carried into the Chapel, a cheer went up and people rushed forward to receive a copy. These are people who have been through a great deal and are hungry for the word of God; one after another at that service they stood and movingly thanked God for His miracles in their lives.

A young man from Nigeria who became a Christian whilst in detention said, "People crave and strive for Bibles here and God is using them to do a great work in our midst."

Please pray for our government to have wisdom in how to deal with this huge challenge of asylum seekers, and pray that God will bring spiritual freedom to all asylum seekers.

### Milnthorpe MOTHERING SUNDAY

If you were an ordinary working-class girl in 14th Century England — or at any time up to the end of the 19th Century — you would probably be sent, at about the age of 12, to work on a farm or 'in service', doing all the menial jobs for the gentry in the, 'Big House'. A boy, you might well have been apprenticed to a tradesman in the nearest town. In either case, you would live 'on the job' - remember Oliver Twist sleeping among the coffins in the undertaker's workshop? Your employment probably began at the New Year hiring fair and by mid-Lent the long hours and almost seven-day week would be very tiring. Then came the first real day off. On Mothering Sunday you were allowed to go home for the day. You might take the traditional gift of a wheaten cake, or some small thing you had made in your craft workshop, and on the long walk home you could pick a posy of spring flowers in the lanes and hedgerows. Mother would have a respite from cooking and housework and go to Church with the whole family (except the eldest daughter who would stay to get the dinner ready!)

The Church adapted this custom. The cathedrals encouraged the parish churches to send parishioners bearing gifts to the Mother Church of the diocese, and in their sermons clergy emphasised the caring, maternal nature of the Church. Mothering Sunday often (as this year) falls conveniently close to the Feast of the Annunciation when we remember Mary the mother of Jesus, and her willing acceptance of motherhood with all the responsibility, joy and pain that this would entail.

At Milnthorpe on 30 March we celebrate Mothering Sunday with a special service for all the family — not forgetting Dad, Grandpa and Auntie. There will be posies for children to present to their mothers, and coffee, fruit squash and Simnel cake afterwards. And a special Milnthorpe mother, father and big sister will bring their 5 month-old triplets for Baptism, Come and pray for our community of Milnthorpe, give thanks for our homes and families, welcome Katie, Lauren and Bethany into God's family, and make this a real celebration
