My Dear Friends

This month contains the most exciting week of the year. There is far more activity than during any other week. In the historical records it takes up 37% of the space whereas the 3 years leading up to it take 60%. The remaining 3% is occupied by events surrounding a birth and the conclusion.

The week I speak of is the one we call Holy Week. Just look at the Parish Calendar and you will see what I mean. For that proportion of space (in the Gospels) to be given to such a short period must surely mean that it is a very significant time and therefore it has more than a passing significance for us. That period has a priority which demands our attention. At Christmas it is early to celebrate and so easy to leave the baby in the manger but the acclaimed King (Paul Sunday), the Prophet of Nazareth, the Son of God on the Cross is a very different matter. Jesus was on that Cross for you and for me — our sin demands that we shall be the ones to pay the price but Jesus 'picked up the bill' and paid it for us because we could not. Now, if we receive Jesus, believe in him, follow him and accept that he did for us, we have a receipted bill stamped 'paid with love'.

The Cross is where sin met more than its match, where it was utterly defeated and where sin can be taken to be dealt with. The Cross is where we all have to take our sin, confess it and leave it. Pride has no place. That, too, must be left at the Cross because it will try to make us think we can earn our forgiveness and in some way pay for it ourselves. The price has been paid and we can all enter newness of life, freed from darkness, released into light and raised to new life.

For Jesus there has no resurrection and glory without the suffering of the Cross. Neither can we enjoy the new life Jesus has an offer for us unless we approach it through the Cross and face up to what it cost Jesus and what it has achieved for each one of us.

May we all be open to the message of the Cross so we can say 'Alleluia, He is risen' with all that it can mean for us.

Our first Sunday was in Singapore where we joined in the final service of the day about the fifteenth! Services in many languages and styles, the one we went to was very lively, with a Malaysian speaking on what we at first thought was Liturgy but then realised he meant 'Lethargy! In the church,' a timely reminder for us all. One of the B & B's in which we stayed was run by people who had been missionaries in Papua New Guinea, it was good to share with them. Then in Wanganui with our friends, who was an assistant Pastor we worshipped at both churches in their parish, in the morning a group of young people telling us about their experience on a Youth with a Mission team in India and Fiji during the Christmas holidays. In the evening a packed ecumenical service with a visiting worship leader.

We visited a Cathedral, where a stained glass window really spoke to me and Chris met and shared with a Korean Pastor and his family. We stayed with the director of CMS in NZ and learnt more of their vision and outreach. We visited 2 other Anglican Churches on Sundays one in Greymouth, which had fantastic work with children and young people and another St Peter's in Queenstown all of which made us very welcome. Finally, our last Sunday on a Pacific Island, Rarotonga we joined with an Assemblies of God service, which was delightful we were welcomed as part of the family, even being given garlands of flowers for our heads!

Wherever we travel in the World we have brothers and sisters, it is such a joy and privilege to meet with a few and enjoy friendship and to be enriched in our faith through them.

Important Meeting Residents Association

At a meeting of Milnthorpe Residents Association, Chairman Malcolm Alston welcomed many parishioners, also Richard Greenwood, Head of Economy and Development SLDC, Iain Stewart CC, Two Parish Council members, and a Police representative. Mr Greenwood gave a detailed account of the proposal development at Junction 36 of M6, which could eventually become the "South Lakeland Gateway". But, he said, these are early days, and it is only a concept as yet, and would involve having various permanent sites, such as limelight on farming, Auction Mart, Visitors Centre etc. Residents voted overwhelmingly for a motion expressing reservation and concern.

Tim Pomfrett, representing Cumbria Association Clubs for young people in villages (part funded by the CG) spoke of the worthwhile work involved. The aim of the Association is to constitutionally set up clubs, starting with a Public Meeting. All "Activity Day" towards this was provisionally arranged for 14 April, being open to young people and others TO HAVE THEIR SAY!!
