

WHAT WE OWE TO WESLEY

The end of last year saw the publication of a book by Roy Hattersley, the well-known politician, with the startling title 'A brand from the burning.' Far from an exercise in inflammatory politics, however, this referred to a six-year-old boy who was the last member of a very large family to be rescued from a destructive fire at their home — the rectory at Epworth in Lincolnshire. The boy was John Wesley whose mother, borrowing a phrase from the Old Testament, repeatedly insisted that her son was "a brand plucked from the burning" and believed that a special destiny awaited him — as indeed it did!

Wesley had been born in 1703 on 17 June and lived to the great age of 87 in 1791. An earlier book on his life and the years that followed has the title 'England before and after Wesley' - which in itself speaks volumes for his achievements which were of national proportions and wider, for he was to become the leading and most famous figure in a spiritual movement generally known as the Evangelical Revival, which changed the face of England and reached as far as the United States.

It gave birth to Methodism which started as a Society within the Church of England, of which John Wesley and his brother Charles, the great hymn-writer, were lifelong ministers. Their aim was not to compete with the ministry of the Church but to supplement it in areas where it was weak or lacking, especially the ministry of church members in addition to that of the ordained clergy, not a few of whom were absentees from their parishes in a corrupt and complacent age. An outstanding feature of this ministry was the local 'class meeting' for fellowship, instruction, learning and sharing — probably not unlike the informal house meetings and home groups which are commonplace in the agenda of many churches today. Another distinctive feature was preaching in the open air, often to crowds in the fields early in the day before work began.

Reactions to Wesley's initiatives were mixed — hostile in the early years and often violent, unacceptable to many clergy who felt threatened but welcomed by others who shared his convictions and were missionary-hearted. A bishop who protested at Wesley's preaching in the parishes of his diocese and in disregard of unfriendly clergy was told memorably — "The world is my parish!" ... and so it seemed.

Following an abortive missionary visit to Georgia in America, Wesley through 53 years became a tireless traveller on horseback throughout the United Kingdom where his journeys are reckoned to have totalled a distance equal to nine times round the world — in the course of which he preached on more than 45,000 occasions, as well as writing 233 books and pamphlets.

His travels were a vital and distinctive feature of his ministry and essential to the promotion and spread of a Christian revival of nation-wide implications — a revival which inspired William Wilberforce's 50-year campaign for the abolition of slavery and the Slave-trade, as well as that of Lord Shaftesbury, the 'poor man's earl,' for the restriction of sweated labour and child labour in factories and chimney-sweeping as well as many other needy causes. The initiatives of others resulted in prison reform, the founding of the Salvation Army, the YMCA, Dr Barnardo's Homes and much else during the nineteenth century — but their inspiration and motivation had been kindled earlier in the previous century, and on that day when Wesley's heart had been "strangely warmed" … when he "trusted Christ alone for salvation" and had received an inner assurance "that Christ had taken away my sins, even mine!"

It is this confident assurance that still makes the difference in the lives of believing Christians of every age and generation.

'Jesus, confirm my heart's desire
To work and speak and think for Thee;
Still let me guard the holy fire
And still stir up thy gift in me'

The weekend, celebrating more than 50 years of music making, was the very first Arnside and Milnthorpe Music Festival, and began with two master classes at St Thomas Church. On Monday 5 May, Mr Evans gave a concert entitled "The Musical World of Wynford Evans", also at St Thomas' Church, with Mr Hopkins as accompanist on the piano.
